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The Slave Trade

In 1788 Parliament passed legislation to limit the number of slaves allowed to be carried on British ships. As a consequence of this HMS Pomona sailed from England to the West African (now Senegal to Angola) coast to monitor slave transports.

One of the officers on the ship was Lieutenant John Incledon-Webber whose family lived in Braunton. The voyage lasted 6 months and his diary of the trip survived which can't be said of a considerable number of the crew who died during the vovage. One entry on 31st October 1788 refers to a visit to Cabinda for fresh water. The king of Cabinda was used to being paid for his water but as 'King's ships never pay for water' he arrived with a large body of men to prevent the sailors from getting the water. John Incledon-Webber was sent ashore to sort this out. He states the the situation was sorted by 'bringing the King on board for dinner with all his attendants, made them very drunk and saluted him on his going on shore with eleven guns. The palaver being settled we have leave to wood and water and everything the country could afford'. Even though this was thousands of miles away and many years ago it seems that a discussion over a glass or two could resolve most problems.
